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PHOTOGRAPHIC COMPOSITION – TELL THE STORY

Every picture tells a story and one of the arts of photography is making it clear what is the story you are trying to tell.

The key to great photography is to develop a clear understanding what it is about the scene that compels you to take the photograph in the first place. This is the underlying story of the photograph. It may not be an action; it could be a mood, a texture or just the beauty of a landscape. There are many stories to tell so photography is a rich art form.

The eyes and the brain create their own composite image of the world while the camera captures its own harsh version of reality. The photographer needs to understand how their camera and lens alters the perception of a scene.

Part of the art of photography is seeing beyond the obvious and using the camera to bring a different view of the world to make the viewer stop and think.

Photography is a visual language and an effective photograph creates its own reality.

Understanding the Camera View

Cameras and lens impose their own view on a scene and the process of visualisation is bending that view to suit the photographer's purpose. The photographer needs to understand how the limited angle of view of the camera lens frames a scene and prioritises parts of it. Then the impact of the variables, such as aperture and shutter speed, and how they can enhance the photographer's visualisation of the scene needs considering.

Choosing the focal length of the lens gives a very different view of the scene. Shorter focal length tends to exaggerate the depth of objects in a scene while longer focal length tends to compress the distance between objects.

Shutter speed is a critical factor in portraying a sense of motion in a still image.

Positioning the Subject in the Frame

There are rules of composition such as the rule of thirds, which are guides where to position the critical aspects of a scene that will support the photog-

rapher's visualisation. Another device is using lines and patterns in the scene to lead the viewer's eyes to areas of the scene the photographer considers important. Even if compositional techniques are not used, the photographer needs to consider them to avoid creating distractions from the story.

Hidden Meaning

This can be the most difficult and complex part of composing an image. There can be many subtle meanings and connotations conveyed by the image created by the cultural context of the viewer. This meaning derives from the viewer's perception rather than the photographer's intention, so where the image is to be displayed needs to be factoring its composition.

A simple example from our stories is typically good guys wear white, while the villains wear black. Some viewers may interpret the choice of colour and exposure levels as value judgement of the subject. Semiotics, the scene of signs, is an important tool for deeper analysis of the hidden meaning in images.

This is an open competition with no restriction on subject matter and a maximum length of 12 minutes. All sequences must however be entered into a section defined as either Documentary, Humour, Theme, Music Poetry Song, and Natural History.

A maximum of 4 sequences can be entered per author and each must be on a separate CD, accompanied by an entry form, a FICHE and a \$10 fee per entry.

If you right-click on your image when a painting tool is selected, a brushes palette will appear.

If your brush cursor has suddenly changed from a brush shape to a crosshair, you have probably pressed the Caps Lock key by mistake. Simply release Caps Lock to return to the brush shape cursor.
